



## Why Write?

Your public official was elected with the stipulation they they serve the interests of their constituents.

### **Ways to Write**

#### Letter

A physical letter that is sent in via mail.



#### **Email**

This is the most common and easiest method of communicating with your elected official.



#### **Public Comment**

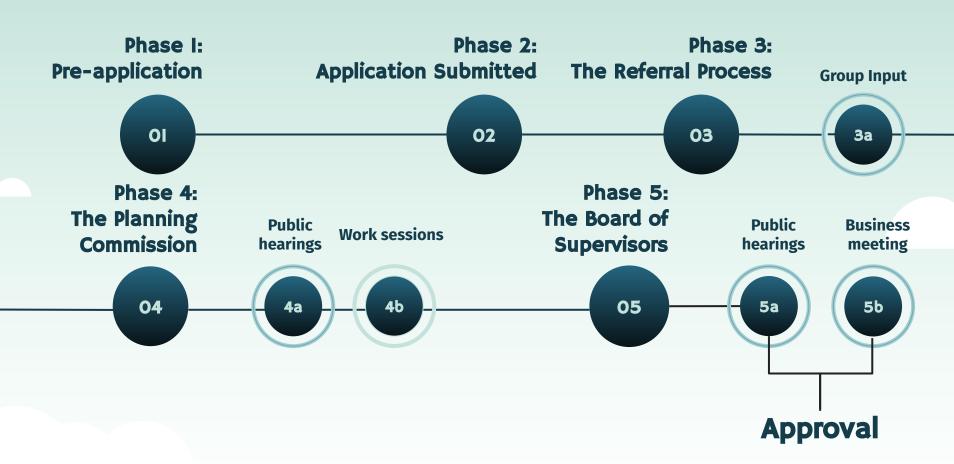
Public Comment is always welcome on applications using LOLA.



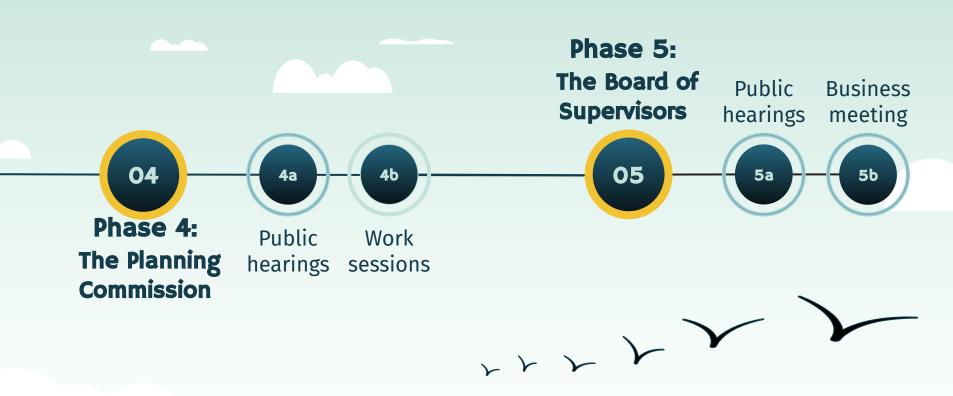

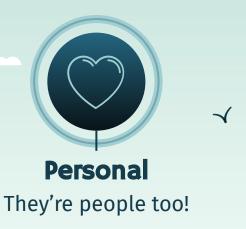
# When to Write? Steps of a Development Application

### The structure of an effective letter

Address Properly

Use a formal salutation to either your district's official or the board as a whole.

Include an Anecdote

A personal story that ties you to the issue helps to persuade

Dear Supervisor

State the Issue

State the item you're writing about and what your position is first

**Close Respectively** 

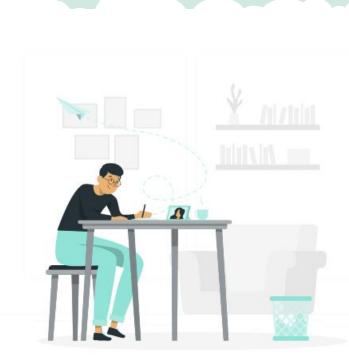
Thank the Supervisor for their time and consideration

# A Step-By-Step on Writing an Effective— Email or Letter

- 1. Use a formal Salutation:
  - a. "Dear Board of Supervisors"
- 2. State the application or general issue you are writing about right off the bat- And your position on it
  - a. "I am writing in opposition of the application proposing..."
- 3. Explain how you're connected to the issue. Here is where you can include a personal anecdote!
  - a. "I would go to \_\_\_ park with my family as a child, and have continued the tradition with my own family.."
  - b. "As a resident of \_\_\_, protecting the wildlife habitat near my home is very important to me"
- 4. Briefly Summarize your knowledge of the issue. Build your credibility by demonstrating you have done your homework, and know what you're talking about
  - a. "The approval of this application would result in..."
- 5. Connect to the bigger picture. Here is where you drive home why the issue is important.
  - a. "This application should be denied to preserve the rural integrity of Western Loudoun County"
- 6. Offer an alternative if you are writing in opposition of a course of action.
  - a. "Install solar panels on existing structures rather than clearing forest for an array"
- 7. Thank the Supervisors for their consideration of your letter and acknowledge past support or collaboration if appropriate.
